What's cooking for this season?

We have several projects on the menu. While it's difficult to know what the final result will be, here's a taste of what the future might hold.

Bob Sarti is completing a new musical called: *Yippies - A Love Story*. Bill Sample has been asked to write the music and Jay has been involved in the dramaturgical process. We are also considering a re-mount/co-production of *Bruce - The Musical* in response to audience members who could not get enough or missed seeing it altogether. (We literally ran out of chairs - one was given to a small dog!)

Mythical Voices for Our Time – has turned into an ongoing five to possibly six year project: There are many good scripts still "sitting on the back burner". These could be produced as part of another One-Act Festival when time, venue and

"Raw, absurd and relevant... But Theatre In the Raw soldiers on"

Polish playwright Slawomir Mrozek's 1968 work *Vatzslav* marks a high point in the oft-censured political journalist's career. While 1964's *Tango* and 1975's *The Immigrants* are the most often mounted of his many plays, with *Vatzlav*, his pen is perhaps at its most sharply absurdist and tragicomic.

There is nary a moment of humour in the piece that doesn't turn somehow political.

Like life under the totalitarian regime of pre-Berlin-Wall-collapse Poland, there is rarely

a moment without multiple meanings. Power structures exist in a number of distasteful and crude combinations and frequently get intertwined. But what links a family with a grown son who wears diapers and also happens to be a bear, a father named Genius whose daughter Justice must be "revealed," and no less than Oedipus Rex in the guise of an old blind keeper of the truth has to a slave who has washed up on the shore of a strange island is explained in the play's 77 scenes. Acting out those scenes are 13 actors - and a prop baby.

Yes, you read that correctly. This work packs in 77 scenes into a mere 120 minutes.

Vatzlav and the Ouch! - Art's Cuts Jay's message on producing a play currently in BC

Vatzlav by Slawomir Mrozek, was suggested to the company by actor, singer and close friend Paul Beckett a number of years ago. It was proposed to the TITR Board numerous times. It received approval each time but it was not produced. Finally, eight years later, during one of the most challenging crunched financial years to face the

arts scene in British Columbia, we mounted the play for a two week run at Studio 16 on Granville Street in Vancouver. The play is absurd, contradictory and sadly it rings true to current, politics, fears, desires, and the obstacles that face artists today attempting to do their work. Mrozek says,

Jay's message on producing a play currently in BC

"Thanks to reason, everything can be set straight, for the world is reasonable." as his characters search for some semblance of order within the chaos. I believe, after working on this show, that Mrozek was prophetic, when Vatzlav states, "I've heard a whole people passed through the sea and reached the other shore without getting wet."

The Berlin Wall fell in 1989, twenty years almost to the day of our production. Then the world celebrated the demise of one of the most complex, infamous and oppressive political structures. Vatzlav had been censored in Poland for many years. The play (written in '68/'69) came directly out of political turmoil and tyranny that we have never encountered in Canada, although there are events that make us feel we understand. We need to be reminded that we can't afford to take our freedoms for granted, that cuts to the arts are also cuts to the throats of artists' voices. We did this play in honour of many a tenacious artist and writer who inspires us to continue through the absurdities of our own existence. In BC, we move forward on will, faith and with a keen interest in expressing ourselves true to the heart. For many in the arts, the heartless budget cuts have been devastating, leaving many of us scrambling for a way to keep our arts organizations afloat. The question is how many will make it to the other shore?

"I got a blister on my left foot and I can feel one coming on my right foot..." says the limping Quail in *Vatzlav*. Like him we keep moving forward...seeking answers and strategies that will help keep a live theatre alive for the future. •

"The Case for Subsidy" from the forward to The Necessary Theatre by Peter Hall

"The theatre as nearly always been subsidized by somebody; the king, the court, the church, the State. The support has often been somewhat hesitant because authority never wholly trusts the theatre: it asks too many awkward questions. It is an instrument of change; it does not normally preserve the status quo. It frequently produces a live debate that frees the imagination and provokes the public to ask questions. It is therefore dangerous." •

Raw, absurd and relevent... Vatzlav

"Some scenes are as quick as one word, however" says Paul Beckett, who plays Oedipus. "The crazy thing is, they all matter."

"It's incredibly relevant to today's world because the absurdity of it is all around us in the present day," adds Jay Hamburger, who, for the past 15 years, has specialized in "giving exposure to voices seldom heard" through Theatre in the Raw.

From works by Gogol to original new plays such as the hit *Bruce - The Musical*, the East Side company has produced 10 full-length works, including five original Canadian premieres and toured a number of one-acts across the country. It's specialty is in art that makes a point at a time when too little does. The company recently had all of its provincial funding axed. This hasn't stopped it from soldiering on and bringing emerging talents such as recent Studio 58 grad Emily Rowed into the fold

"I play the role of Justice, who is lied to and betrayed by her father [played by Hamburger] and, ultimately, comes to see the world tragically," says Rowed.

This exposure to the truth ties in with a burlesque dance number central to the storyline.

Musician Earle Peach composed the original music for *Vatzlav* and Hamburger put his pen to paper for the lyrics. This wasn't unfamiliar territory for him. Hamburger wrote lyrics for some tunes in the classic musical *Godspell* that still brings in royalties. He says that these have had to be dipped into to make this production come to be.

But it's worth it for such "an absurdist tour de force to be seen locally." •

Our fundraising team is hard at work on a possible co-production of *Vatzlav* for a provincial or international tour down the road. •

The PAL Theatre in Vancouver; The Templeton Studio Cabaret (in the Globe Theatre) in Regina; The Colin Jackson Studio (Prairie Theatre Exchange) and Ragpickers Anti-Fashion Emporium in Winnipeg; The Saskatchewan Native Theatre Company in Saskatoon; The Third Space (Northern Light Theatre) in Edmonton and the Motel (One Yellow Rabbit Theatre) in Calgary.

The tour was a great way for a small very gifted company of actors to see what's going on with theatre outside of their own Vancouver area. It was also a great opportunity for those who saw the shows to become acquainted not only with what Theatre In the Raw is doing but what is coming from the West Coast in relation to the spoken word.

Every two years we receive many distinct and innovative plays from all over Canada and the world. We then commit to dramaturgical consultation one-acts selected for stage/radio production. Some of the winning plays from our 2007 contest were presented during our Festival of Mythical Plays & Winning One-Acts mini-tour.

Mythical Voices for Our Time & Festival of Mythical Plays & Winning One-Acts Mini-Tour

In June and July of 2009 we produced *The Festival of Mythical Plays and Winning One-Acts*. From that production two original one-acts

came from our *Mythical Voices for Our Time* project, which we had been working on since late 2005.

We chose this project because we wanted to bring together writers from various, social, economic and ethnic backgrounds. The playwrights were asked to write a one-act play or radio-play based on and related to their culture's myths. To take it a step even further, we asked

writers to personalize their myth and if possible, modernize it in some way.

The Festival of Mythical Plays and Winning One-Acts supports Theatre In the Raw's mission to develop playwrights and new playworks. We developed, dramaturged nearly from "scratch" a number of these one-acts with three to four experienced theatre consultants who helped to get the plays ready to be performed. Some of the plays presented came from the Mythical... project as well as winners from our 2007 Biennial One-Act Playwriting Contest.

For the record we produced and performed four original myth one-acts at nine different venues in Vancouver, BC, 2006-2009. Those plays were:

Bonsai Friend by Petronella van Oyen, The Toe Cutter by Bill Pollett, The Telling of the Bees by Jesse Matthew Cooper and Jack Benny & the An-

gels by Jason Logan.

All the one-acts were broadcast over Co-op Radio's *Arts Rational* program: and given extensive stage readings. *Telling of the Bees* was also fully staged.

There are 11 writers whose plays were not produced that were submitted for *Mythical Voices for our Time* plays project. The venture has proved to be most fascinating and very reward-

ing. We look forward if time, finances permit to present more of these myth one-acts at a later date.

We were excited to have the privilege to tour the lower mainland once again. (including Abbotsford, Chilliwack, Burnaby, Vancouver).

With this project we have produced 4 original one-act mythical plays over a 4-5 year period. If time, funds and patience allows there are a number of other original mythical one-act scripts from this project waiting in the wings to be produced.

Building on the Success of *Bruce – The Musical*

"...What polish! What energy!
What feeling! In short, what a fabulous

November 2009 production of Bob Sarti's "Bruce –The Musical" had the largest audience of any of our mainstage shows in the past 15 years. We presented 10 performances during the Heart of the City Festival at the historic Russian Hall in Strathcona. Bruce was also nominated as Best New Work at the 2009 Ovations Awards.

This musical extravaganza recreates events in the life of Bruce Eriksen, the late founder of the Downtown Eastside Residents Association (DERA). He was instrumental in transforming the image of Vancouver's lowest-income neighbourhood from Skid Road to a residential community. It is a story of tragedy and triumph, told with humour, action, and song.

The story takes place circa 1973-76, when Eriksen overcame his addiction to alcohol, became an Iron worker on the Knight Street Bridge project and then fought successfully to make the beer parlours and hotels of the Downtown Eastside safer for the old loggers and other retired resource workers who lived there. Later, he won a seat on city council, where he gave headaches to the NPA

dinosaurs.

A semi-pro/professional cast of eleven portrayed Eriksen and local legends, Libby Davies, Harry Rankin, Jean Swanson and the diverse and vibrant characters from the community. The actors were accompanied by a live jazz trio led by award-

winning composer Bill Sample under the direction of Jay Hamburger.

Raw pulled out all the stops when it came to publicizing the show. Taking advantage of the Provincial and Vancouver civic elections that happened in the weeks prior, Bob and other volunteers took it to the streets leafleting numerous All-Candidate Meetings with the now famous *Vote*

for Bruce flyer. It was guerrilla marketing at it's finest!

This production also marked the first time we were granted support from the City of Vancouver's Office of Cultural Affairs Transit Shelter Advertising Program. This provided placement

of posters at 10 transit shelters. The promotion boosted ticket sales and widened our audience.

We were impressed with how well this original script aligned with our mandate of "exposing voices seldom heard". In this case it was the voice of a local Vancouver hero who stood up for marginalized citizens who are often forgotten and ignored. Bob Sarti's script recalls past and continuing issues. We are reminded that the disenfranchised can have a voice; that attention and support needs to be given to those of low income and homeless; that fatal dangers lurk out there for low income members that need to be recognized and acted upon before it is too late; that a heritage building (Carnegie Centre) had to be saved in order to establish a vital community building in the center of

one of Canada's poorest postal codes. We found that there was an audience out there yearning to revisit a sense of community and to have many of these concerns addressed in an artistic manner.

Stay tuned for news of a possible remount to coincide with Bob's latest Vancouver-themed musical play - *Yippees - A Love Story*.
